Trees on development sites - the dos and don'ts

The construction exclusion zone (CEZ) is the area around a tree needed to protect the root system. It is shown on a tree protection plan (TPP)




Adherence to the TPP is usually a planning condition: if you breach this you risk enforcement action & potential costly delays. Damaging a TPO'd tree can lead to prosecution



Erect and maintain the correct protection barriers




Construction Exclusion Zone (CEZ)



CEZs are sacrosanct Within them DO NOT:

- Store anything (including soil)
- Leave building materials
- Disturb the ground
- Park or drive vehicles



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Results of breaching the CEZ:

X Soil compaction

Starves roots of oxygen and nutrients and increases water run-off

X Cut or damaged roots

Can affect a tree's health and even its stability

X Turf or soil removal

Damages finer, shallow roots and inhibits feeding

X Branch/limb damage

Reduces the leaf area and can make a tree more susceptible to pests and disease

> All trees are different: a CEZ is approximately 12 x diameter of the trunk





Most of the vital absorption is done in the first metre



Root damage can take months or even years to become apparent



Roots are living tissue. They absorb nutrients, water & oxygen, and provide anchorage

A tree can take up to four times as much space below ground as above
